At Mount Pleasant School we are committed to ensuring that all pupils, regardless of their specific needs, make the best possible progress and achieve their full potential. Quality first teaching and additional interventions are implemented across the school. We regularly review and record what we offer for every child in our care to make sure that we provide a personalised learning experience. We make it a point to discuss hopes and aspirations with all our pupils, who are fully included in all aspects of school life.

All teachers are responsible for every child in their care, including those with special educational needs and disabilities.

At Mount Pleasant School:

- We take steps to ensure SEND pupils are not treated less favourably than other pupils. Please find further information within the SEND Policy.
- The Headteacher and the SENDCO have overall responsibility for SEND and Inclusion.
- Inclusion issues are regularly discussed at Senior Leadership meetings. Provision for children with SEND is constantly under review and amended where and when necessary.
- We monitor the quality of our provision, together with the progress and well-being of children with SEND. This is through our monitoring cycle and consists of learning walks, observations, planning and book scrutinies and discussions with pupils, teachers/keyworkers and support staff.
- The progress of children with SEND is carefully monitored through termly pupil
 progress meetings and half-termly reviews, as well as observations by leaders to
 support staff. The SENDCO holds regular meetings, with all who work with the
 children, to review provision and set new Individual Learning targets
- We fully involve our Governors when the SEND policy is reviewed and revised.

The kinds of SEND (Special Educational Need and Disability) that are provided for:

Mount Pleasant School can provide to meet a range of needs. We have virtual access to specialist support which includes SaLT and educational psychologists.

Identifying pupils with SEND and assessing their needs:

We will assess each pupil's current skills and levels of attainment on entry. Class teachers will make regular formative and summative assessments of progress for all pupils and identify those whose progress:

- Is significantly slower than that of their peers starting from the same baseline
- Fails to match or better the child's previous rate of progress
- Fails to close the attainment gap between the child and their peers
- Widens the attainment gap

This may include progress in areas other than attainment, for example, social and emotional needs.

Slow progress and low attainment will not automatically mean a pupil is recorded as having SEND.

When deciding whether special educational provision is required, we will start with the outcomes of what is deemed as expected progress and attainment, and seek the views and the wishes of the parents if we have a concern. We will use this to determine the support that is needed and whether we can provide it by adapting our core offer, or whether something different or additional is needed.

Consulting and involving pupils and parents:

We will have an early discussion with the parents and pupil when identifying whether they need additional educational provision. These conversations will make sure that:

- Everyone develops a good understanding of the pupil's areas of strength and difficulty
- We consider the parents' concerns
- Everyone understands the agreed outcomes sought for the child
- Everyone is clear on what the next steps are

Notes of these early discussions will be added to the pupil's record and given to their parents. We will formally notify parents when it is decided that a pupil will receive SEND support.

Assessing and reviewing pupils' progress towards outcomes:

We follow the graduated approach and the four-part cycle of assess, plan, do, review.

The class or subject teacher will work with the SENDCO (Special Educational Needs and Disability Coordinator) to carry out a clear analysis of the pupil's needs. This will draw on:

- The teacher assessment and experience of the pupil
- The pupil's previous progress and attainment and behaviour
- The individual's development in comparison to their peers and national data
- The views and experience of parents
- The pupil's own views (where appropriate)
- Advice from SEND support services, if relevant

All teachers and other staff who work with the pupil will be made aware of their needs, the outcomes sought, the support provided, and any strategies or approaches that are required. We will regularly review the effectiveness of the support and interventions and their impact on the pupil's progress.

Supporting pupils moving between phases and preparing for adulthood:

We will share information with the setting, school, or college the pupil is moving to. We will agree with parents and pupils which information will be shared as part of this.

At MPS we prepare pupils for transition in a variety of ways. KS2 children have a positive experience, which includes having time to research their new school and surrounding area and put

together a PPT which they share with the whole school; parents are invited in to celebrate and show support.

Plans are put in place if required, for parents and pupils to have a virtual meeting when moving to their next school.

Our approach to teaching pupils with SEND:

Teachers are responsible and accountable for the progress and development of all the pupils in their class.

High quality teaching is our first step in responding to pupils who have SEND. This will be adapted for individual pupils.

We will also provide the following short-term interventions:

- Apples and Pears Spelling programme
- Dancing Bears Reading programme
- Little Wandle Phonics Catch up and Rapid Catch up programmes
- Working memory

Adaptations to the curriculum and learning environment:

We make the following adaptations to ensure all pupils' needs are met:

- Adapting our curriculum to ensure all pupils are able to access learning, e.g. mixed ability groups, additional adult support to scaffold learning when required, lesson content, questioning techniques and peer work.
- Adapting our resources and teaching style to personalise learning
- Using recommended aids, such as laptops, coloured overlays, visual timetables, larger font, tangible resources and iPads.
- Adapting our teaching, for example, recall of previous learning, longer processing times, pre-teaching of key vocabulary, thinking aloud - teacher and pupil.

Additional support for learning:

When possible, additional adult support will be provided dependent on the needs of individuals or groups of children. Work will be scaffolded to provide temporary support, ultimately promoting independent learning and a deeper understanding of new concepts.

The environment is designed to support children with individual needs e.g. visual timetables, individual workstations, working walls, identified curriculum areas, desk top resources and reading areas.

We have teaching assistants who are trained to deliver short term interventions and we have specialist support from the DCS SEND advisory service which includes speech and language and the educational psychologist.

Expertise and training of staff:

- Our SENDCo and teachers all have experience of working with and supporting children with SEND. Two members of staff have the L7 National Professional Qualification for SEND
- Our LSAs have access to a wide range of courses including the Council for Awards in Care, Health and Education (CACHE) which are nationally recognised and respected.
- Within the school we have a culture of sharing good practice and expertise; this enables us
 to ensure our staff have as much knowledge as possible within the field of supporting
 children with SEND

Equipment and facilities:

Children with SEND will have access to the appropriate resources needed in order to help them to make progress e.g. phonic mats, coloured overlays, pencil grips etc.

Evaluating the effectiveness of SEND provision:

We evaluate the effectiveness of provision for pupils with SEND by:

- Reviewing SEND pupils' individual progress towards their goals half termly
- Reviewing the impact of interventions after an agreed number of weeks
- Using pupil questionnaires/pupil voice
- Asking for parental views
- Monitoring by the SENDCO and Senior Leadership Team (SLT)
- Using provision maps to monitor impact
- Using in-school progress data to monitor progress

Enabling pupils with SEND to engage in activities available to those in the school who do not have SEND:

- All of our extra-curricular activities and school/setting visits are available to all our pupils, including our after-school clubs
- All Y5/6 pupils are encouraged to go on our residential trip(s)
- All pupils are encouraged to take part in sports day, school plays and special workshops such as STEM
- No pupil is ever excluded from taking part in these activities because of their SEND

Support for improving emotional and social development:

We provide support for pupils to improve their emotional and social development in the following ways:

- We are an inclusive school that holds a child's development as a rounded individual as a priority
- The class teacher has overall responsibility for the pastoral, medical and social care of every child in their classroom
- We listen to the views of the child and place this information on a 'Pupil Profile' which is shared with relevant staff once permission has been given from parents
- A weekly PSHE lesson and PSHE assembly takes place to listen to pupil views and encourage positive behaviours which align to our school values.

We work together to show consideration and kindness and contribute to shared goals, our school motto 'Together we shine!' promotes positive behaviours and mind-set.

Working with other agencies:

Mount Pleasant School works closely with DCS specialist services and can currently access on base the BFSAI social worker and Medical Centre.
